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
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Guardalavaca Stands Out among Tourist Destinations

Importance of Accessible Tourism

HAVANA.- Cuban professor and researcher José Luís Perelló stated that accessible tourism is an essential element for the development of the travel industry at present.

He affirmed that this travel modality could generate incomes amounting to about 90 billion dollars this year, which represents a 65 percent increase in this decade, according to a study conducted by Emerald Insight.

Perelló added that traveling is an opened door to new experiences and perspectives; however, it represents a series of obstacles and limited options for over one billion disabled people

With an aging world population and increasing health problems, the need for an accessible tourism is more urgent than ever. In this sense, the specialist pointed out that in recent years, the so-called chimney-free industry is taking an important step to improve the experience of its millions of quests.

It is a unique and appropriate change, whose main challenge at present is not only to offer alternatives with different price ranges but also with high levels of quality that stand out, particularly, for their inclusive

In spite of the progress made, many companies and suppliers still do not know how to conduct this new model of development; for that reason, the objective is to offer support through information and experiences that promote new initiatives addressed at accessibility, the professor commented.

He also said that travel companies often consider the travel market for the disabled persons as a legal requirement, instead of taking advantage of this as a business opportunity.

According to the European Network for Accessible Tourism, the world annually loses over 150 billion dollars because of the lack of facilities for disabled travelers.

The Saudi Arabia multiple project developer, Red Sea Global (RSG), is benefitting from this opportunity by integrating inclusive designs and facilities in its Red Sea destination since the planning stages.

Perelló made reference to different types of limited accessibility to this form of travels, such architectonic and urban designs, transportation systems, communication and web.



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Empowerment and Accomplishments

HAVANA.- Women empowerment, gender equality and a wide-ranging number of rights are some of the accomplishments Cuban women have achieved, although there are still some challenges to face.

After the triumph of the Revolution in 1959, headed by historical leader Fidel Castro, the implementation of public policies addressed at making progress in Cuban women's inclusion and the development of their potentials became a priority.

At present, women hold 55.74 percent of positions in the National Assembly of People's Power, thus having a prominent role in the drafting of the country's economic, social and political policies.

At the same time, 51,000 Cuban women work in science and technology-related activities and 69,6 percent are involved in the public health sector.

Likewise, of the ten Cuban inventions that have received the Gold Medal of the World Intellectual Property Organization, six of them are the main authors. In all this process of emancipation and empowerment, the Cuban Women's Federation, created by Vilma Espín on August 23, 1960 to defend the same rights for everyone and end discrimination, has played an important role. In addition to achievements in topics such as equal contribution in productive areas and managing tasks, as well as acknowledgement to the contribution they make to their families as the core of

the society, Cuban women still face sexist stereotypes and prejudices that hinder their full fulfillment.

Because of the above, the implementation of the National Program for the Progress of Women is the cornerstone for the development of actions addressed at guaranteeing equal rights and the institutionalization of policies on the topic. In addition, the Families Code establishes the economic assessment of domestic work, attention to senior adults or with people with disabilities, and strengthens the figure of vulnerable ex-spouse, among other issues.

In the last five years, important government policies have been approved, including the Comprehensive Strategy for Prevention and Attention to Gender Violence in the family scenario.

The said strategy is part of the will of the Cuban State and Government to create the mechanisms for the comprehensive and systematic attention to that phenomenon, which affects our society, through the articulated and coordinated action of different actors.

In addition, it endorses the constitutional mandate of favoring women's comprehensive development and their full social participation, and guarantees the exercise of their sexual and reproductive rights, while protecting them from gender violence in any form and space.

Education with UNESCO Standards

HAVANA.- Cuba ratified the strategic importance of education for sustainable development, with justice and social inclusion, during the XIX Pedagogía 2025 International Congress, in compliance with UNESCO and the UN 2030 Agenda.

In this event, held from February 10 to 13 with the participation of over one thousand teachers from 30 countries, Cuba set the course for this sector, in tune with the Fourth Sustainable Development Goal defended by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

Cuba's experiences ratified that education is a human right that provides and fosters other rights established by the United Nations and sets the course to face world challenges that have an important impact on Latin America and the Caribbean.

Cuban minister of education Naima Trujillo mentioned among those challenges equal access to technological development, knowledge, innovation, technology and its effects in productive processes, so that they are sustainable and are in harmony with the environment. UNESCO acknowledged the commitment of the Cuban educational system as the basis for peace and sustainable development, for its conception of a transforming and solidarity teaching that uses a large network of schools aligned with the concepts of that UN body.

The Cuban educational experience is endorsed by dozens of thousands of persons who, in 30 countries of the world, have learnt to read and write thanks to the Yes, I can teaching method, an expression

of the solidarity vocation of the Cuban Revolution, Trujillo stated.

Cuba has a network for the internationalization of education that gives hope to millions of people in the world and whose purpose is to share knowledge and increase the quality of the teaching institutions in the country and other nations

With that purpose in mind, 163 PhD programs are conducted in 39 universities and authorized institutions.

At the forum, several countries of the area appreciated Cuba's collaboration in the field for the impact it has on the elimination of illiteracy among their most vulnerable population, being Honduras the best example highlighted by the press accredited to the event.

Honduras and Cuba strengthened ties through the signing of new agreements that reinforce the abovementioned internationalization policy in the educational field, a sign of the model of relations between nations with similar interests and destinies.

Thanks to the Cuban teaching method, over 400,000 Hondurans have learnt to read and write, and now have the intention of enrolling the educational system to raise their level of instruction. Pedagogía 2025 also showed successful teaching practices in relation to the use of technologies, science and innovation

A meeting of the Confederation of Latin American Educators executives and the I Forum of Cuban Teachers leaving abroad were also held as part of the congress.

Tough Policy on Cuba

WASHINGTON.-All it was needed was for January 20 to arrive. The president elect, Donald Trump, reverted what his predecessor, Joe Biden, had stipulated just six days

It took four years for the Democratic president to undertake the path he had promised during his electoral campaign in relation to the policy on Cuba, and when he did it, the definition could not be different: it was a late

Cuba "should no longer be designated as a State sponsor of terrorism", the White House affirmed in a release on the notification the then president sent to the Congress.

He also issued at exemption to Title III of the Helms-Burton Act, also known as Liberty Act, for a period of six months and rescinded the National Security Presidential Memorandum-5 of 2017 on the policy toward Cuba to eliminate the so-called "Restricted List."

The measures were welcomed as an elemental justice duty to the Caribbean island and a step in the right direction, although the blockade remained unaltered.

However, at the stroke of the pen and shortly after returning to the Oval Office, his Republican successor revoked all orders Biden took in relation to the policy on Cuba. Five minutes were more than enough, Trump said. On January 31, Secretary of State Marco Rubio issued a release clearly stating that the "tough" policy on the island, which should characterize the next four years, was

Rubio reinstated the Restricted List, a step to restore the United States' "tough" policy on Cuba in the next four

The head of the U.S. diplomacy not only reinstated in that list entities that were already sanctioned, but included one more: Orbit S.A., a channel for the sending of remittances to the Caribbean island.



According to Rubio's statement, who during his term as a senator was one of the main architects of the U.S. policy on Cuba at the Congress, Orbit S.A. is a remittance processing company that "operates for or on behalf on the Cuban military." change in the U.S. sanction regulations."

Thus, as it was to be expected, shortly after, Western Union notified the suspension "with immediate effect" of money transfers to the Caribbean nation "because of a

Solidarity and Love

NEW YORK..- Cuba is famous worldwide for its solidarity and love, for its desire to collaborate even with the U.S. people; for that reason, the inclusion of the island in a list of countries that allegedly sponsor terrorism is unbelievable.

That is the view of executive director of the Pastors for Peace Interreligious Foundation for Community Organization (IFCO), Claudia De la Cruz, who in an interview with The Havana Reporter stated her rejection to president Donald Trump's decision of revoking the measures his predecessor, Joe Biden, took in favor of Cuba a few days before



She said that "it is important to be able to expand and strengthen solidarity ties with Cuba, with the Latin American and Caribbean region, with the world, and from IFCO we consider that there is a lot to be done."

In particular, "we want to preserve the legacy of reverend Lucius Walker, the legacy of many of those who have joined IFCO and Pastors for Peace (...) They paved the way in this fight against the blockade," the activist added.

In present times, it is essential to fight the misinformation campaigns against Cuba by the Trump government and conservative sectors of the Democrat Party, she commented.

In that sense, it is important to work in the new conditions of hostility toward the island by the government of the United States, added De la Cruz, former 2024 presidential candidate for the Socialism and Liberation Party.

To us, as well as to the Pastors for Peace caravans of the 1990s or the beginning of 2000 that conducted actions to denounce, confront and demand the end of the unhuman blockade, it is a must to continue demanding the elimination of Cuba from that list, she stressed.

Part of reverend Lucius' legacy - which was preserved by his daughter Gail Walker, former IFCO executive director – includes support to Cuba and that is what we will continue doing from the United States, she said.

De la Cruz affirmed that as part of the actions to fight fake narratives, we have to stress that Cuba has not been involved in any way in terrorist actions; however, the United States has indeed coordinated, promoted terrorism against this country, a terrorism that on many occasions has come from Miami.

In relation to the present deportations by the Trump administration, the IFCO executive director condemned the sending of undocumented immigrants to the detention center located at the United States naval base in the illegally occupied territory of Guantánamo.

"We are seeing that conditions are being created to receive at that naval base about 30,000 people deported from the United States as if they were terrorists," the activist commented when highlighting that the rights of the immigrants sent there are being violated.

To us, as part of the solidarity project with Cuba, it is also a must that the Guantánamo naval base is closed, that the Cuban people gets back a territory that belongs to them, and that the blockade, immorally imposed for over 60 years, is finally lifted.

Long List of Female Scientists in Cuba

HAVANA.- The National Statistics and Information Office, (ONEI) has revealed that about 51,000 Cuban women work today in science and technology-related activities, which represents the highest number in recent years.

But they are not just numbers, because behind such figures, there are names such as that of Rosa Elena Simeón, who was the president of the Cuban Academy of Sciences (ACC) for many years and also the first woman to hold the position of Minister of Sciences, Technology and Environment. Simeón headed the fight against African swine fever and examined a novel analysis method on studs' artificial insemination.

Another outstanding female scientist is Concepción Campa, leader of the research that allowed developing the world's only vaccine with proven effectiveness against meningitis B and C, which is applied in several countries of the world since 1988

The list also includes winners of the Sofia Kovalievskaia prize in its seventh edition: Beatriz Marcheco, clinical geneticist and Director of the Medical Genetics Center; Martha Ana Castro Peraza, of the Pedro Kourí Tropical Medicine Institute (IPK); and Mayra Paulina Hernández Sánchez, of the Material Technology and Science Institute. The abovementioned prize is granted since 2005 by the Foundation that carries the name of the famous Russian scientist and feminist from the 19th century.

During the pandemic of COVID-19, many female scientists were in the front line fighting the disease, participated in the Sciences in 2022.



development of new research projects and co-headed trials of the vaccine candidates developed in Cuba.

Two of the eight Cuban academicians selected in 2020 to join the International Board of Experts as part of the Advisor Group top fight COVID-19 were women.

One of such academicians, Tania Crombet, director of clinical research at the Molecular Immunology Center and one of the leaders of the CimaVax-EGF vaccine against lung cancer, was chosen as member of the World Academy of

Guadalupe Guzmán Tirado, IPK research and diagnosis director, was the other academician selected, and although her work focuses on dengue studies, she conducted research on epidemic neuropathy, Zika, pandemic influenza and the SARS-CoV-2 virus.

Guzmán was also chosen among the 45 women of sciences from 37 countries to receive the International Awards L'Oréal-UNESCO for Women in Science, an acknowledgement that praises Cuba's prestige worldwide thanks to her research, which allows understanding and better treating dengue.

Dr. Sonia Resik, another IPK member and head of the virology department, headed studies on health intervention with the Abdala vaccine and contributed to research on poliomyelitis in Cuba.

Many other Cuban female scientists have also played an essential role in medical and biotechnological research, as well as in Cuba's success in the fight against COVID-19, in the search for sustainable solutions to environmental and social challenges, and in making Cuba become a referent in science and technology worldwide.

by the International Organized Telecommunications Union (ITU) and the Ministry of Communications of the Republic of Cuba, the summit (GYS-25) will be held on-site and will welcome ITU members, Generation Connect Youth Envoys and invited guests from the United Nations and other related organizations.

The summit also aims at exploring and harnessing the potential of young minds in the digital era and fostering global intersectoral and intergenerational dialogue that actively involves them.

According to the program, the first day, youngsters will talk about their role as agents of change for green digital transformation and climate action, as well as about the relevance of transformative technology from a deep dive into Artificial Intelligence for connectivity.

The agenda also includes sessions on topics such as intergenerational dialogue and its contribution to ICTs for health, wellbeing and a better future.

Participants will also discuss about how ICTs are revolutionizing telehealth, fostering safe listening practices and dealing with mental health challenges in all age groups. Delegates will likewise talk about cybersecurity, digitalization of societies and economies, and the ever-increasing exposure to cyberattacks and threats.

The purpose of the event is to find solutions to anticipate online risks, share essential skills to stay safe on the Internet and consolidate a solid resilience in the field of cybersecurity in the long run.

Other topics will deal with networking and speed partnership to promote and foster the implementation of youth-led projects and activities in the exhibition space; empowerment from the economic aspects of ICTs, and digital transformation: innovative business models.

Cinemateca de Cuba Celebrates its 65th Anniversary

HAVANA.- This year, the Cinemateca de Cuba (Cuban Film Library) celebrates its 65th anniversary with the screening of a series of films, both classical and contemporary, whose program started in February 6, the day of its creation.

Attached to the Cuban Film Institute (ICAIC), the entity has conducted one of the most constant cultural works in its over six-decade long history, focusing its efforts in the preservation and safeguarding of the national and international film heritage.

The center safeguards the documents of the film history kept in its vaults, be it books, magazines, posters, essays, film reviews, among others.

Since the beginning, the Cinemateca de Cuba's main objective has been the establishment of a sustained and permanent dialogue between spectators and the cinema, both the one made at present and the one considered classical today.

As part of such premises, it is opened to movie buffs, researchers and students involved in movie-related careers as a center for study and consultation, allowing access to materials of interest on the cinema and its history.

The center's director, Luciano Castillo, said in a recent interview that film programming and screening is another form to approach the audience.

Throughout these years, the institution has treasured a varied collection of Cuban and foreign film titles that have been screened as part of thematic cycles or tributes paid to outstanding seventh art figures.



Historically, such exhibitions lead to debates headed by specialists which result in reflections, the specialist added

The film that opened this cycle of celebration was Porte de Lilas (1957), directed by René Clair, which was highly acclaimed in its première and is based on the novel La Grande Ceinture, by René Fallet.

The opening of this anniversary also included several short films by the Lumière brothers, inventors of the cinematograph – the first equipment that was able to screen and project moving images.

The initial program of these celebrations included the screening of high-definition (4K) quality restored films, thanks to the use of techniques in photograms' restoration and the application of color to images, based on their original tones.

The abovementioned short films were not the only ones restored and screened on this occasion, but also Napoleon (1927), by Abel Gance. The sound of the copy of this work was also retouched, as well as the high-definition image, and a narrator was added in replacement of the dialogues. Other productions that are highly acclaimed by spectators and the specialized critics were also added to the celebrations, such as the feature films Blade Runner (Ridley Scott, 1982); Breezy (Clint Eastwood, 1973) or the recent Rapito (2023), by Marco Bellocchio.





Galería Habana in Mexico

MEXICO CITY.- Galería Habana, an entity with a vast history in the promotion of Cuban art, exhibited the work of four Cuban artists at the Zona Maco Fair, a famous art event held in Mexico.

In its 21st edition, held in the capital's Citibanamex center, the event welcomed the proposal of the Cuban gallery, which included sculptors and multimedia artists from different generations, such as Esterio Segura, Glenda Salazar, Roberto Fabelo Hung and Lianet Martínez.

In the case of Segura, an artist with a solid formation, the Cuban stand exhibited Good Bye My Love. Mambo Number Five, a wall installation made of painted glass fiber, while Salazar's work included pieces of the series Pinturas en Silencio (Silent Paintings).

On her work, Salazar told **The Havana Reporter** that the main idea "comes from the search of the essence, which are fragments that delimited in the piece" and "also talk about the same process of thought in which we get involved."

The creator, who attended Zona Maco for the third time, said that connecting the Cuban art with galleries

from different countries of the world was an enriching experience, as well as exchange between creators and the audience.

Roberto Fabelo Hung, for his part, exhibited two pieces – one of them, Untitled (Liquid Havana) – while Lianet Martínez presented two pieces of the series Coraza: una instalación (Ecdisis/Contención/Transmutación/Matria/Puntal/Doble naturaleza/Asentamiento) and an interactive sculpture (Encuentro).


Galería Habana, attached to the Génesis Galerías de Arte Company of the Ministry of Culture, indicated that in its most recent series and works on public spaces, Martínez has used the motif of the shield as a symbolic element linked to the body, its fragility and self-protection.

"But also to courage as a permanent challenge in the face of everyday life and the vicissitudes of the female condition," the entity added.

The present edition of Zona Maco, the largest fair of its type in Latin America, welcomed over 200 galleries from the continent, in addition to Africa, Asia and Europe.

According to the Mexican Culture Secretariat, the initiative emerges as an inclusive space of visibility and dialogue that fosters talk between famous figures and younger voices, particularly from Latin America.





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Biopharmaceutical Collaboration Increases

CHANGZHI.- Chinese and Cuban authorities inaugurated the first phase of a joint biopharmaceutical company settled in the high-technology industrial development zone located in this city, in the province of Shanxi.

Cuban ambassador to China, Alberto Blanco, stated that this step reaffirms the huge potentials to increase bilateral cooperation in this sector.

Governor of the Shanxi province, Jin Xiangjun, stressed the importance of guaranteeing key factors and the necessary support services for this joint work, focused on medicine and industrialization research and development.

According to the official website of the Changzhi municipal government, the objective of the project is to promote significant progress in antibody biomedicine production.

"The city of Changzhi focuses on areas such as electronic information, new energies, biomedicine and high-range equipment manufacture, and is working to cultivate an industrial park of billions of yuans, as well as to build a provincial demonstration zone for comprehensive transformation and reform," the official site indicates.

The Cuban ambassador recently affirmed that relations between China and his country in the biotechnology field increase and develop satisfactorily since the last 20 years.

"The high level of political relations between our two countries and the close friendship between our peoples allow us to continue strengthening a strategic alliance with important results and huge potentials," he added.


In statements to **The Havana Reporter**, president of the Biotech Pharmaceutical Limited (BPL) joint venture, Bai Xianhong, praised the contribution of the Cuban scientists and experts.

He also described BPL as the largest collaboration between both nations in the biopharmaceutical field, and in that sense, he recalled the success of the first humanized monoclonal antibody of the giant Asian nation.

"Nimotuzumab provided an efficient treatment against cancer to over 300,000 Chinese patients", he stressed.

The president also affirmed that cooperation with Cuba will remain in the next years; the joint venture will improve the monoclonal antibody production capacity and will establish leading lines of perfusion in the world, based on mammal cells' culture.

The province of Shanxi, with a population of about 39 million inhabitants, is located at the west of the country's northwestern region and its capital, Xi'an, is famous for marking the beginning and end of the Silk Road caravans and being home to the well-known Terracotta Army.



New Decree-Laws approved

HAVANA.-The Council of State of the Republic of Cuba approved three new decree-laws at the ordinary session of that body, in compliance with the legislative program, official sources indicated.

The regulations are related to the Simplification and Integration of Arrangements in the Administrative Management; the peaceful and safe use of nuclear energy and ionizing radiations, and Trade Brands and Names.

The first of such draft laws is addressed at regulating simplification, integration and computerization of

administrative arrangements, particularly those linked to legal entities and individuals, in light of its improvement.

The aforementioned laws also foresee making a good use of the peaceful benefits nuclear energy and ionizing radiations have for the society through their application in the medical field

In that regards, the legislation establishes that all practices or activities linked to uses that are not peaceful are forbidden in Cuba, in tune with the regulations established in the Constitution of the Republic and the international agreements signed by the Cuban State.

The decree-law on the Trade Brands and Names, for its part, has the objective of protecting Cuban trade brands and

names through the granting of patent rights, considering that the request, granting and the rest of the legal acts or businesses involving such rights are registered at the Cuban Patent Right Office.

At the meeting, held last February 12, in addition to the approval of these decree-laws, information was also provided on the regulations to face gender violence.

On the topic, deputy prime minister Inés María Chapman presented the 2024 Report on the Results of the Implementation of the Comprehensive Strategy for Prevention and Attention to Gender Violence and in the Family Scenario.

President of the National Assembly of Peoples' Power (Cuban parliament) and member of the Council of State, Esteban Lazo, stated on the topic that legal ordering offers large protection in the face of this phenomenon.



Literature is Again a Special Treat

HAVANA.- The 33rd edition of Havana's International Book Fair recently reaffirmed itself as one of the cultural events that gathers the highest number of people, and as usual, most of its activities took place at the San Carlos de la Cabaña Fortress, in the capital.

Held from February 13 to 23, with South Africa as the guest of honor, initiatives also reached 18 different sub-venues in the Cuban capital, under the José Martí's premise that "To

read is to grow" and the thematic line "A whole country in books". The fair also included the participation of over 400 foreign guests from more than 40 nations.

This year's edition paid tribute to researcher and professor Francisca López Civeira, National History and Social Sciences awardee, in 2008 and 2022, respectively and poet, essayist, researcher and literary critic Virgilio López Lemus. The event also commemorated the 25th anniversary of the territorial publishing houses system (SET) and the 130th anniversary of the death in combat of Cuban National Hero José Martí.

The fair put at the disposal of the audience over two million printed copies and more than 2,600 digital books, in addition to 2,500 artistic-literary activities and book donations to schools and hospitals, among other actions

More than 15 South African authors participated in the event with their works, which were launched at the pavilion dedicated to the guest country of honor. Children, youth and culinary books, novels, short stories and other materials were also launched.

South Africa is the third nation of the continent that attended the fair as guest of honor, after Angola and Algeria.

Personalities from the field of culture and politics; authors; editors; publishing houses; promoters and booksellers from several continents met at Cuba's largest arts party that, at the conclusion of the capital edition, will tour the rest of the provinces, until its closing the present month of March at Santiago de Cuba province.

In addition to literature, other artistic expressions were also present, including music, dance, visual arts and cinema, for visitors' enjoyment.

As it usually happens, the Literature, History, Editing, Social and Humanistic Sciences and Design awards were granted at the La Cabaña Fortress, in addition to other important prizes, such as the Alejo Carpentier and Nicolás Guillén (poetry) awards.

The main activity of this fair was the launched of the Biblioteca del Pueblo, a collection of 82 volumes that gathers the best works of the Cuban and universal literature. The theoretical program included spaces such as the Professional Book Hall, with the holding of the National Bookseller Workshop; the Editors and Literary Translators Meeting, and the Public Policies in Favor of Reading meeting, in addition to the Ibero-American Young Writers and Poetry Promoters meetings.

HAVANA.-Hemingway's experiences in Havana; Mafia visits to the Hotel Nacional; the death of famous pimp Yarini; the romance between Eulalia of Bourbon and the Prince of Asturias; Federico García Lorca's experiences in Cuba, are some of the stories renowned journalist Ciro Bianchi includes in his recent book.

The volume, entitled La Habana de Hemingway y otras historias (Hemingway's Havana and other stories), gathers lesserknown, exotic and curious stories that had already been published in the Cuban journal Juventud Rebelde.

I had the intention of including figures that called my attention since I was a child, like Andarín Carvajal and Ernest Hemingway, Bianchi said at the launch of the book at the La Cabaña Fortress, in the framework of the Havana's International Book Fair that ended in February 23.

The director of the abovementioned institution, Miguel Cruz, affirmed that this was a special launch, because La Habana de Hemingway y otras historias reveals unknown details about the history of Cuba.

In addition, Havana is the focal point that joins these stories on important personalities, sportspersons, artists, politicians and even Mafia members, he added.

On many occasions, Bianchi has been close to the events he writes about or knew the characters of his stories; that adds a lot of value, Cruz affirmed.

After the launch at the La Cabaña Fortress, the journalist signed several copies and stated his desire to continue publishing books on lesser-known events that happened in Havana.



Doctors Prevent Blindness in Mexico

MEXICO CITY.- Cuban ophthalmologists contribute to the training of health professionals and the recovery of sight among patients with low resources at the Mexican state of Baja California Sur.

In statements to **The Havana Reporter**, Teresa de los Ángeles Casanova, head surgeon of the Cuban team at the Juan María de Salvatierra Hospital, in the city of La Paz, talked about the characteristics of their work and the results obtained as part of the collaboration between both nations.

According to the member of the Cuban medical brigade in Mexico, the center, a reference institute, receives patients with eye traumas and there, three Cuban professionals provide attention to all of them, from newborns to senior adults.

"Every week, we carry out surgical procedures, including pterygium, cataract and other types of diseases that have an ocular cause," said the

doctor, who stressed that in 2023 and 2024 they conducted surgery campaigns linked to the second disease mentioned before.

The Cuban professionals have also been involved in "ablation processes, multiorganic transplants, have worked with surgeons in kidney and cornea procedures, trying to get organs for patients in need," she commented. "We have been directly involved in all the hospital services, such as pediatrics, oncohematology in children, including interaction and follow-up to those children, in addition to the gynecology and internal medicine services, among others," the doctor explained.

In relation to the purpose of the work they conduct in this country, focused on preventing blindness, the specialist, who has 33 years of experience, expressed her satisfaction for being able to help many people recover their vision and have a better quality of life.

We have many moving stories, especially in regards to attention to children, because we also receive children with eye traumas and the fact that a minor "does not have a disability or does not lose an eye is something very precious which is given for free," she stressed.

In her opinion, the Mexican people not only appreciate the attention the Cuban specialists provide in relation to health, but also their sensitivity and humanism, as well as respect to the profession they exercise, "a feature acknowledged worldwide."

In addition to attention to patients, the Cuban ophthalmology team present at the Juan María de Salvatierra Hospital have also conducted workshops on organ donation, particularly cornea, and have worked on the formation of residents with the purpose to develop a cornea bank.

Since their arrival, in 2022, they have also collaborated in activities linked to prevention and health education with patients suffering from diabetes, which has a high incidence in Baja California Sur.

To Casanova, who had previous experiences in Yemen, Jamaica and Ecuador, Mexico has been very important because of the integration attained, the learning of protocols, the organization of the service and the clinical practice guidelines established in the country.



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Descendencias, A Dialogue about Races and Traditions

Ecuador, Two Models in Dispute

QUITO.- Ecuador will go back to the polls next April 13 to elect the president, either Luisa González, of the Revolución Ciudadana (RC) party or Daniel Noboa, the incumbent president who hopes to be reelected in a balloting that shows social polarization, with two models in dispute.

Noboa and his team apparently hoped to win in the first round, even though several surveys and experts predicted a pretty tight contest between the incumbent president and the representative of the pro-Correa movement.

After the announcement that he would have to run again for the presidential seat, the president did not even show up at the site where his supporters and the press were waiting.

Communicator and sociologist Irene León, of the Network of Intellectuals and Artists in Defense of Humanity-Ecuador Chapter, stated that the idea of considering a supposed victory of the president in the first round was a media strategy that ultimately did not work.

"Many people are in favor of an urgent change because of the critical conditions

the country faces in all fields and that was seen in the closing days of the presidential campaign with the popular support to the RC candidate, as it has not been seen for a long time", León told The Havana Reporter. According to the analyst, the runoff election is a moral victory to González amidst a scenario of potential fraud and irregularities. International observers ruled out the

possibility of fraud but made warnings in relation to the fact that the process was unequal because of the candidatepresident's legal outrages.

Other analysts consider that Noboa has

been able to get around obstacles, such as the 14 daily hours of blackouts, the crime committed against four children from Guayaguil, the security crisis, economic



difficulties and other problems, with a campaign based on TikTok, dances and music.

They added that after Noboa declared the domestic armed conflict in January 2024, as a strategy against organized crime, a firm-hand vision against insecurity took roots in the country, attached to the extreme right.

However, according to León, González has offered a comprehensive and humanist proposal on the problem, which allows a democratic sector of the society to follow that path in order to face the main concern the Ecuadorans have.

In relation to the economy, the RC stance on the diversification of the sources of incomes and other forms of growth, placed on the agenda topics that had not been recently discussed in public debates, the sociologist

The second round, thus, will again be tough and the RC movement should have to stick to the principles already announced, León

The runoff election, between the same candidates as in 2023, predicts a clash between two opposing visions of country: neoliberalism, endorsed by the oligarchy and media power bloc, and a social economy, supported by the progressive sectors, which also claim the pro-Correa inheritance, historian Juan Paz y Miño indicated.

Noel Rolando Benítez, one of the producers who have benefited from these initiatives, commented that some of the project's main contributions include training and the use of science and technology, as well as the creation of strategies for the closing of the productive cycles.

He also acknowledged the boost given to crops' diversification, mostly vegetables, root vegetables, grains and fruits, in addition to the production of small livestock meat, eggs, rabbits and pork.

HAVANA.- The 25th edition of the Cigar Festival returned to the Cuban capital, highlighting attractions to those luxurious products and their impact on the international market.

The holding of this event, from February 24 to 28, was a unique opportunity for smokers and professionals of the sector, who enjoyed a program that included visits to tobacco plantations, reports on the most recent productive results, talks, exchanges, among other activities.

The objective of the festival was to go in depth into the world's best cigars and their passionate culture, linked to the condition of the soil, the climate and farmers' experience.

This five-day event included tours to cigar factories and plantations; blending sessions; three special nights dedicated to matchless brands; the Habanos World Challenge Contest; the Commercial Fair, and the International Seminar.

On this occasion, the 150 years of the Romeo y Julieta brand was highlighted at the opening ceremony, in addition to a panel on the 35 years of the La Casa del Habano franchise and a night dedicated to H. Behike, a terms that comes from the legend of a doctor or chief of the Taíno tribe (indigenous group of Cuba), is considered one of the most luxurious products of the industry.

This cigar, created in 2010, has become a symbol of the Cuban cigars' tradition and prestige and has consolidated itself as the best kept secret of the Cohiba brand.

Cohiba, created in 1966, was the first cigar brand manufactured after the triumph of the Cuban Revolution, in 1959. Its name, which makes reference to an instrument used by the Cuban indigenous population to light the tobacco leaves, is today a synonym of excellence in the world of Premium cigars.

Behike in particular, with a limited production, is manufactured at the El Laguito factory in Havana and uses the best tobacco leaves of the San Juan y Martínez and San Luis regions, in the Pinar del Río province.

Such leaves, known as medio tiempo (half time) or Fortaleza 4 (strength 4), are extremely rare as they only come from the top part of the tobacco plant cultivated under the sunlight, which gives an additional value to this already exclusive product.



Cuba Contributes to Ecological Cement Research

SANTA CLARA.- The Low Carbon Cement LC3 Experimental Plant, located in the central province of Villa Clara and the first of its type in Cuba, diversifies its activities in light of the development of this material in the world.

PhD José Fernando Martirena, director of the Center for Research and Development of

Structures and Materials at the Marta Abreu Central University of Las Villas (UCLV) and head of the project, commented that they also work on materials' testing, automation processes and other innovations linked to the construction field.

The Cuban industry is a world pioneer of the work with LC3 ecological cement, a type of material that is capable of reducing carbon dioxide emissions to the atmosphere during its

manufacturing process, like no other material of its type.

The most recent United Nations report on the topic, published under the title Low Carbon Cement: Harmonizing environmental goals and housing needs, indicates that at present, there are 22 plants of this type worldwide, which last year were capable of producing over 50 million tons of ecological cement.

Work relations between the Cuban plant and foreign entities contributed to that

accomplishment, especially as a result of its raw material evaluations, the holding of real industrial tests and the definition of technical parameters for productive scales. Martirena also explained that this type of cement can reduce the environmental impact of productive industries up to a 40 percent – a worldwide attractive figure in a sector that is to reduce pollution.

The Cuban industry, attached to the UCLV, has ties with European and Latin American nations, in pursuit of the development of that material.

This experimental plant is an important research center that analyzes new materials and automation processes, in addition to other innovations linked to the construction industry, José Fernando Martirena, an expert from the Villa Clara province, told the local press.

In the meantime, the Vanguardia newspaper informed that member of the Party Central Committee and first secretary at the Villa Clara province, Osnay Miguel Colina, recently visited the plant, which is not only focused at producing low carbon cement but also certifying construction materials' samples, following rigorous analysis of their physical and chemical features, in addition to their composition.



Baseball, Backups and Reflections

HAVANA.- Las Tunas, Pinar del Río, Granma, Industriales, Santiago de Cuba and Ciego de Ávila baseball teams qualified to the third edition of the Cuban Elite Baseball League and although the squads tried to patch their weaknesses during the backup lottery, many achieved to do so, but others did not.

Making an anticipated analysis or predicting what could happen is rather difficult in a

selective tournament such as the Cuban, when at any time baseball players can go on a contract with professional leagues and not all backups get adapted to their new home, amidst the economic difficulties the country faces.

However, considering the list that managers now have in hand and based on my personal experience, only four teams emerged victorious in the magic night in which, in a couple of hours, they solved most of their problems.

In my opinion, such teams – Industriales, Las Tunas, Pinar del Río and Ciego de Ávila – knew to better consider their needs, were luckier in the selection order or had the privilege of choosing players who, on backstage, stated their desire not to be chosen by any other team. Industriales could not fish better in troubled waters after catching, above all, two national team members: catcher Andrys Pérez and shortstop Erisbel Arruebarrena.

In addition to providing better protection in the central line, a key element to win in baseball, the team recovered the soul of the squad (Yosvani Peñalver), added an excellent batter (Dennis Laza) and a closer such as Armando Dueñas, who is one of Cuba's most powerful throwing arm.

Las Tunas, two-time national champion, should be delighted, because in addition to its strong offensive, it wisely chose a defensive catcher (Nelson Batista), a high-ranking field utility (Luis Vicente Mateo) and several quality pieces for the Leñadores mound, the team's main weakness.

In the meantime, Pinar del Río anticipated the departure of two its main pitching stars and covered those absences with outstanding pitchers Yunieski García and Geonel Gutiérrez, in addition to veteran closer José Ángel García, Cuba's all-time leader in saves.

Ciego de Ávila, hit by an avalanche of resignations at the beginning of the year, in an instant became again a competitive squad after getting strong in almost all fronts.

In the case of the Granma team, although it caught some powerful pitchers such as Alain Sánchez, Noervys Entenza and Yanieski Duardo, in addition to an excellent catcher such as Andy Cosme, it came short in relation to the infield.

Finally, Santiago de Cuba made a good choice with José Amaury Noroña, who must increase the team's offensive power, but failed to strengthen its power in the bullpen, although it got a breath of air in positions near the bases with Jeison Martínez and José Ángel Sánchez.

Although it might sound like a cliché, the field has the final say.

As of March 15, the "Play Ball" will be called out and there will be more elements to make predictions.



Young Chess Players Win Bronze Medal in Russia

MOSCOW.- The young team of Cuban chess players won third place in the second Russian Intellect Academy Cup, held in the city of Novokuznetsk.



The territories chosen underwent a process which proved that they have the highest violence rates in recent years. Their potentials


to guarantee the success of the project was also taken into account.

Hernández championed the importance of eliminating stereotypes and discriminatory practices that perpetuate violence and added that attention to men will also be an important step to eradicate sexist attitudes and reach equity.

In that sense, Canadian ambassador to Cuba, Mariancik Tremblay, praised the Cuban government's commitment to the fight against this global problem and stressed that the project complements the program's cooperation objectives between both countries, focused on improving gender equality and women empowerment.

Meanwhile, head of the UNFPA office in Cuba, Marisol Alonso, reaffirmed the FMC commitment to the 2030 Agenda and highlighted that the eradication of gender violence is an essential objective.

Alonso also explained that this project, which is based on the strategies already in place in Cuba, allows including international experiences that can help improve the effectiveness of the services offered.



The main objectives of this include the opening of a telephone line to immediately attend potential victims and the creation of a training process for future employees of the service.

It will also focus its objectives on data and statistics collection through diagnosis studies and the creation of a constant and interoperable register of the attention services. These actions are not only directed at responding to violence situations but also

preventing them and fostering a safer environment for all Cuban women and girls.

The project, to be extended until 2029, will give priority to the objectives included in the Comprehensive Strategy for Prevention and Attention to Gender Violence, the 2030 Agenda, the National Program for Women Progress and the National Plan for Cuba's Economic and Social Development.
